COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course explores the role played by identity in causing serious social conflicts, in influencing their dynamics, and in resolving, mitigating, or transforming them, and will highlight major theorists who have examined identity and conflict. Course materials will address the question of how identity/self/subjectivity are constituted, as well as aspects of identity such as race, ethnicity, gender, religion, class, and nationalism. Special emphasis will be placed on the relationship of identity to violence. Readings, films, class discussions, and assignments are designed to help students: 1) become better conflict analysts and resolvers; 2) gain awareness of the role played by their own identities in analyzing conflicts; and 3) write clear and cogent papers.

CONF 302 fulfills all of the writing-intensive requirements for the Conflict Analysis and Resolution (CAR) major through the assignments listed on this syllabus. Throughout the semester class time will be devoted to discussions that focus on improving writing skills. As well students are encouraged to visit the Writing Workshop for additional assistance.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Attendance in class is crucial to success in this course. Some material relevant for completing assignments will be discussed only in class, not in the readings. You should complete the assigned readings prior to each class. Ask in class if you have not understood a term or idea. Come prepared to participation in classroom discussion.
